
Australian Curriculum

A Guide for Parents

The Australian Curriculum sets out what all young Australians are to be taught, and the expected quality of their learning as they progress through schooling. At the same time, through State developed syllabuses, it provides flexibility for schools and teachers to build on student learning and interest.

The development of the Australian Curriculum means that greater attention can be devoted to equipping young Australians with the skills, knowledge, understandings and capabilities necessary to enable them to effectively engage with and prosper in society, compete in a globalised world and thrive in the information-rich workplaces of the future.

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA), in collaboration with states and territories, has developed an agreed Australian Curriculum for English, Mathematics, Science and History. Each of these learning areas includes content statements that represent essential learning for all Australian students.



The Australian Curriculum focuses on ensuring an entitlement to a sound body of knowledge, skills and values for all students while acknowledging that the needs and interests of students will vary. The curriculum provides the content and a set of achievement standards which dictate the expected quality of learning in year levels from K to Year 10.

The NSW Board of Studies has worked closely with teachers and key education stakeholders to develop from the Australian Curriculum syllabuses that give further detail and clarification for teaching and learning in our State.

The new State syllabuses build on the strength of the existing NSW curriculum. Many features of the new K–10 English, Mathematics, Science (incorporating Science and Technology K–6) and History syllabuses are evidence of this.

The syllabuses identify the knowledge, understanding, skills, values and attitudes that students are expected to develop in each learning area. They are designed to provide flexibility for teachers to engage all learners in a contemporary way. Literacy and Numeracy remain important areas of focus in K–6, where essential foundation skills are developed.



In addition to subject-based content, all syllabuses address important contemporary themes and general capabilities as students prepare to live and work successfully in the 21st century and beyond.

These include cross-curriculum priorities and general capabilities and other learning across the curriculum areas identified by the Board of Studies.

The general capabilities (critical and creative thinking, ethical behaviour and personal and social capability, and the cross-curriculum priority – Sustainability) complement our Religious Education framework. Having a consistent approach to teaching and learning enables teachers to work and plan collaboratively to provide a high quality education for all students.

Catholic schools and colleges in our diocese will start the implementation in 2014.
